 - 1. Why do you think Paul says this?
 - 2. Do you think Jesus' death might be a "stumbling block" or "foolishness" to people today?
 - 3. What does the cross mean to you?
- 3. Read Romans 5:6-11. Identify every description of us or our action. Then identify every description of God or His action. What do you notice?
- 4. How does the cross express God's holiness and love, fulfilling Psalm 85:10? "Love and faithfulness meet together; righteousness and peace kiss each other."

- 7. Theologian Bruce Demarest argues that "the cross liberates from the power of sin, propitiates God's wrath, washes away the guilt and stain of sin, reconciles believers to God, and achieves a cosmic victory over deadly spiritual foes." But he also claims that "Christ's example of suffering on our behalf releases a new moral power that transforms our attitudes, motives, and conduct."²

 - 2. Where do you still need repentance, growth, grace, prayer, or action?
